


C.  2. Who the cause of Christ would yield? Who would leave the battlefield? Who would cast away his shield? Let him basely go: Who for Zion's King will stand?  
3. By the mercies of our God, By Emmanuel's streaming blood, When alone for us he stood, Ne'er give up the strife: Ev - er, to the la - test breath,


