William Walker also arranged this Scottish traditional tune for three parts in 1835, which was included in *The Sacred Harp*, p. 152, from 1844 through 1911.

Hauser's arrangement (above) differs from Walker's in many ways: key, time, rhythm, lyrics, and all four music parts.
