If Ye Love Me is perhaps one of the most well-known pieces in the English choral repertory. The anthem first appears in the 'Wanley Partbooks' (Bodleian, Oxford, Mus. Sch e. 420) dating from c. 1548-50. However, the tenor volume from this partbook set is missing and therefore this piece has been edited from its first appearance in print which is in John Day's 1565 publication Certaine notes set forthe in foure and three partes (n.b. parts of this publication appear in 1560).

Tallis was one of the first composers to set English text to music for services in the new reformed church and this is typical of many other pieces composed in period immediately after the English Reformation. It has an ABB structure and it abides by Edward IV's new instructions that choral music must be breif and succinct: 'to each syllable a plain and distinct note.' The only melismas in this piece come at cadences.

Source: John Day, Certaine notes set forthe in foure and three partes, London, 1560.

Text: Source spelling have been modernised. Editorial text repetitions are in italics.

Note Values: Original votes values have been retained.

Accidentals: No editoral accidentals are necessary; all accidentals are as they appear in the source.

Recommended Performance Pitch: as written (this edition is transposed up a fourth). Transpose as required.

Other notes: Some editions have the Tenor part rising to the third in the last bar. This does <u>NOT</u> appear in the source and has often been recklessly added by editors without justifying it's addition.
